St. Joseph Hospital's Arts in the Atrium Helps Heal

St. Joseph Hospital's team passionately believes that art helps heal. Its effort to build art and artistic experiences into its culture dovetails beautifully with the hospital's mission to "provide healing and care for the whole person, in service to all in our communities."

One especially inspiring approach the hospital has taken to heal is revitalizing its Arts in the Atrium program, which was popular prior to the COVID-19 pandemic and returned recently to focus on:

- Enhancing the hospital's environment by displaying local artists' work.
- Hosting musicians from different genres to entertain for special events.
- Partnering with community artists to offer unique classes and opportunities to be creative.

Past events include:

- A quarterly artwork installation facilitated by the Nashua Area Artists' Association.
- The sale of art, from which the hospital receives 15% of the purchase price.
- A lunchtime performance by Symphony NH, composed of many Nashua musicians.
- A patriotic choral performance by World Academy students to acknowledge Veterans Day and honor local veterans.

"Displaying art, hosting musicians and partnering with local artisans is a powerful way for us to bring the community together," shares Michele Canto, manager of volunteer services, who oversees the program. "Our efforts are genuinely appreciated by patients, family members, visitors and staff. We look forward to hosting several events and improving attendance throughout 2023 and 2024."

She adds, "Our entire team knows that providing care for people isn't always clinical. Arts in the Atrium events provide opportunities to bring our hospital community, as well as the Greater Nashua community, together. There is great value in bringing people into the hospital to reintroduce them to all the different types of care we provide."


St. Joseph Hospital Named 'Business of the Year'

Ninety-three percent of St. Joseph School of Nursing's graduates remain in southern New Hampshire following their graduation and subsequent licensure.

Colorectal Screening Grant Will Help Save Lives

Did you know colon cancer is the second-leading cause of cancer-related deaths and the third-most-common cancer in both men and women? Early detection is key to better survival rates.



Thanks to a \$50,000 grant from the Coverys Community Healthcare Foundation, jointly awarded to St. Joseph Hospital and the American Cancer Society, we can help increase early detection in our community. The one-year program seeks to identify and treat colon cancer at

its earliest stage and educate community members about colorectal cancer screening guidelines. Screening should start at age 45 and is especially important for communities of color, which are disproportionately affected by colon cancer mortality rates.

We wish to make colorectal cancer screening access as streamlined and easy as possible. Therefore, screening reminder cards are distributed to patients at well visits. They are imprinted with a QR code and an email address to make requesting a colorectal cancer screening easier. Part of the grant funds will also cover direct transportation costs to help qualifying patients travel to and from screening appointments.

Staff members are receiving training on the importance of timely cancer screening and how to implement strategies to improve it. Additionally, St. Joseph's "cancer screening champions," Carol Lesage and Kara Gill, who are both physician assistants, are dedicated to supporting and promoting the program.

This valuable grant initiative will be lifesaving for many patients. St. Joseph Hospital is committed to offering its community the most convenient and cost-effective means to get screened for colorectal cancer. Funding for screening programs such as this enables the hospital to continue this important work and fulfill its mission of offering compassionate care to all.
